MISSION STATEMENT The Wisconsin Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) Association champions the needs of abused and neglected children by supporting and expanding local CASA programs. Giving every child who has experienced trauma through abuse or neglect a voice in Wisconsin.

HOW CASA WORKS

CASA serves children up to the age of 18. Judges appoint CASA volunteers to advocate for children's best interests. Every CASA Advocate works with legal and child welfare professionals, educators, and service providers to ensure that judges have all the information they need to make the most well-informed decisions for each child. The Advocate stays with each case until it is closed and the child is in a safe, permanent home.
